## LETTER FROM PASTOR



I still remember thinking that the year 2020 was far off when I was younger and here we are six years past it already. Whether it be taking up a new activity, giving up an old habit, or changing our life in some way, New Year's is often seen as a time for a fresh start. The reality is though, just because the calendar indicates a different year does not mean we have or get a clear break from past situations, problems, or habits. The same relationship problems, issues, etc. will follow us from one year to another. Sure, a new year can bring a fresh perspective and new optimism for moving forward, but it is not a true blank slate for a fresh start that is untethered to the past.

Through our baptism into Christ, our sin, guilt, and shame have been removed. We have been fully refreshed with a garment of righteousness given to us by our savior.

## CONNECTING TO GRACE

What are your thoughts on New Year's resolutions? Some people are all about them and others are not. There are so many different types of New Year's resolutions that vary just as much as the people who do them. For this reason, there are even various programs and people that promise to help you make your New Year's resolution successful. Studies have shown that while there are many variables that play into the success of a New Year's resolution, two factors usually make them more likely to work. First, the resolution must be something reasonable to obtain, not just a wish or a dream. Second, the person resolving to do said resolution must have outside support for it to be successful. Experience as well as data shows that a reasonable goal with support is far more likely to be achieved.

What does this have to do with us as followers of Christ though you may ask? Well, a great resolution, in fact, maybe the best resolution for the new year that you could have, is to be better connected to God's grace. Regular New Year's resolutions can be a good thing, but being regularly connected to God's grace is absolutely worth it. God wants what's best for you, and there is nothing better than being connected to His grace through Word and Sacrament. Titus 2:11-12 tells us "for the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people, training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passion, and to live self-controlled, upright, and godly lives in the present age." Talk about an awesome goal. Unfortunately, it's a goal, or resolution, that we cannot achieve on our own.

Praise God for His grace that does what we cannot do for ourselves. On our own, we cannot even believe in God or His grace that comes through Jesus Christ (see 1 Cor. 12:3); that would be an unreasonable resolution.

However, Jesus Christ, by the power of the Holy Spirit working within us, makes the impossible possible. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, we "can draw near to God, [so that] he will draw near to [us] (James 4:8)" allowing us to be connected to His grace. Each time we read/hear His word, go to Him in prayer, and participate in worship, God's grace works in us to bring about all that is promised.
